

Camp Protocol When Camper/Staff Tests Positive for COVID-19

The purpose of this document is to help camps and parents/guardians understand:

- *What will public health do if a camper/staff tests positive for COVID-19?*
- *What will the camp do if a camper/staff test positive for COVID-19?*

It also answers the following questions:

- *What type of information will the camp be asked to provide if staff/camper tests positive?*
- *What type of information will public health provide the camp if staff/camper tests positive?*
- *Which information sheet should be provided to parents/guardians?*

Camp Protocol When Camper/Staff Tests Positive for COVID-19

Camper or staff tests positive for COVID-19

WDGPH contacts the staff, camper (or camper's parent/guardian) to conduct a risk assessment

Camp operator will receive notification from WDGPH

Camp provides cohort lists for camper/staff who tested positive for COVID-19
(as soon as possible)

Information needed may include:

- Attendance records
- Cohort lists
- Bus/transportation information (if applicable)
- Updated contact info for campers/staff
- Records of essential visitors/sign-in or visitor logs

WDGPH will perform risk assessment to identify **high-risk** and **low-risk** contacts from the camp setting

Camp will send **Camp Case Information Letter** home to all parents/guardians/staff

WDGPH will inform camp operator of which campers/staff are high-risk contacts (HRC) (e.g. camp cohort); Note: cohort may be dismissed if in-progress during the day

- 1) Camp will send **WDGPH HRC letter to those identified by WDGPH as HRC** to provide guidance on self-isolation and testing recommendations
- 2) WDGPH will provide camp operator with recommendations for infection prevention and control measures (if applicable)

High-risk contacts must follow the guidance from Public Health for testing, isolation, return to camp guidance, and direction for household members.
*Refer to **flow chart for high-risk Contacts**.

Note: Personal health information may be disclosed to camps only for contact tracing. Camps have an obligation to protect the personal information of their campers. Camps are not to disclose the identity of the case except to those other camp employees who require it as part of their job function. The identity of the case should not be disclosed publicly to parents, or to other campers unless deemed necessary by public health or given permission to do so by the case or their guardian.
