Announcements and Changes to Services

 On November 9, the <u>Government of Ontario</u> announced it is taking immediate action to enhance the local public health response to COVID-19 in Peel Region by expanding access to testing as well as increasing case and contact management and hospital capacity.



- On November 9, the <u>Government of Ontario</u> announced it is investing \$5 million to help offset revenue losses for eligible agricultural and horticultural societies impacted by the necessary cancellation of fall fairs and exhibits during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- On November 9, the <u>Government of Ontario</u> announced it is seeking individuals specifically those who are unemployed or have been displaced from the retail and hospitality industries or administrative roles as well as students in education programs to re-enter the workforce and make a difference by helping seniors living in long-term care homes.
- On November 6, the <u>Government of Ontario</u> announced its intention to move Ontario's public health unit regions to the <u>Keeping Ontario Safe and Open Framework</u>.
- On November 5, <u>Finance Minister Rod Phillips</u> released <u>Ontario's Action Plan: Protect, Support, Recover</u> the next phase of a comprehensive action plan to respond to the serious health and economic impacts of COVID-19.

Ongoing COVID-19 Action

Face Coverings

On October 2 (<u>see News Release</u>), the Ontario government announced that when you go out anywhere in Ontario, you must use a face covering (non-medical mask, such as a cloth mask) in public indoor spaces and whenever physical distancing is a challenge. This includes <u>public spaces</u>, <u>workplaces and vehicles that operate as part of a business or organization</u>, with some exceptions.

As the season begins to change and people start to spend more time indoors, an additional recommendation from the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) is for individuals to consider the use of face coverings that are made of three layers, including a filter layer. The addition of a filter layer improves the level of protection that can be provided by non-medical face coverings. This is not to say that there is currently any reason to throw away non-medical face coverings that are made of two layers. These face coverings remain effective if they fit closely against the face covering the nose, mouth, and chin, and are changed or laundered frequently. However, as individuals look towards purchasing or making new non-medical face coverings, it is recommended to use the updated guidance from PHAC and choose those with three-layers of protection where possible.

COVID-19 Testing

Please check your local <u>assessment centre</u> for details on booking an appointment. Public Health <u>DOES NOT</u> provide testing. No referral is needed but you must meet the testing criteria. **Bring your health card to the assessment centre** (if you have one). It is OK if it is expired. Presenting your health card allows you to:

- Check your test results online. Public Health only calls those who test positive.
- Be treated or prescribed medication for other respiratory conditions if needed and if this option is available at your assessment centre.
- Move through the testing process faster.

Further instruction will be provided by the clinician at the assessment centre based on individual assessment.

Individuals can also get tested for COVID-19 by booking an appointment at <u>select pharmacies</u> if they meet certain criteria. Check our website for details.
