**SUBJECT:** COVID-19 testing, clearance and isolation requirements for resident

admissions to long-term care and retirement homes

Long-Term Care and Retirement Homes should refer to Directive #3 for Long-Term Care Homes, at <a href="https://www.health.gov.on.ca">www.health.gov.on.ca</a>, for all requirements that must be met for new admissions and readmissions.

COVID-19 testing and clearance, admissions can occur if:

- The resident has been tested for COVID-19, has a negative result and is transferred to the home within 24 hours of receiving the result, OR
- The resident has been confirmed infected and cleared of COVID-19.
  - Residents being admitted who have been cleared of COVID-19 do not need to be re-tested or undergo 14-days of self-isolation.

As stated in Directive #3, a resident has been cleared of COVID-19 if they have had lab-confirmed COVID-19 more than 14 days prior to admission to the receiving home.

An admission/re-admission of a resident who is positive for COVID-19 may be made providing that it is approved by the local public health unit.

A negative result does not rule out the potential for incubating illness. Unless the resident has been confirmed infected and cleared of COVID-19, the receiving home must have a plan to ensure the resident being admitted/re-admitted can complete 14-days of self-isolation, under Droplet and Contact Precautions and is tested again at the end of self-isolation, with a negative result. This second test can occur as early as day 10 of isolation. If the result is positive, the resident must complete another 14-days of self-isolation. A resident that is awaiting a test result must continue to stay in isolation until the test result is received and next steps can be determined.

## For residents previously confirmed infected and cleared of COVID-19:

- A resident that has been previously confirmed infected and cleared of COVID-19 should not be re-tested for admission/re-admission to a Long-Term Care or Retirement Home unless new onset of symptoms occurs. If the individual is symptomatic, the decision to test should be based on clinical judgment and be at the discretion of public health.
- If further guidance is needed about if a resident has been cleared of COVID-19, or if testing is required prior to an admission/re-admission, facilities should call WDG Public Health Call Centre for consultation.
