SUBJECT: Updated HIV Testing Guidelines for Ontario

- New HIV Testing Guidelines for Ontario are now available.
- The window period for lab-based serologic HIV tests is now 6 weeks.
- HIV point-of-care (POC) testing can be accessed at the WDGPH clinic in Guelph.
- Post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) must be initiated within 72 hours of a high risk exposure and can be accessed through local emergency departments.
- Pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) should be considered for those at ongoing high risk of infection. Resources exist to support community prescribers. Patients can also be referred to HIV/AIDS Resources & Community Health (ARCH).

Last month, the Ontario HIV Treatment Network (OHTN) and Ministry of Health issued <u>updated</u> <u>guidelines</u> for providers offering HIV testing. The guidelines focus on four scenarios where HIV testing is recommended, based on symptoms and risk:

- 1. Identifying **new or recent infections** in individuals with symptoms or high risk exposures;
- 2. Identifying **chronic infections** in individuals with indicator conditions;
- 3. Testing populations experiencing higher rates of HIV infection; and
- 4. Testing in **specific care situations** where the outcome would impact care.<sup>1</sup>

A <u>one-page summary algorithm</u> of the new guidelines are included as an attachment.

### When to Test following a Possible HIV Exposure

Due to lab advances, the window period for patients receiving lab-based serologic testing has been shortened from three months to six weeks.<sup>1</sup> These patients should be tested using a **3-6 approach**:

At baseline  $\rightarrow$  3 weeks after exposure  $\rightarrow$  6 weeks after exposure

Patients using only point-of-care (POC) or self-tests still have a window period of three months and should be tested using a **3-6-3 approach**:

At baseline  $\rightarrow$  3 weeks after exposure  $\rightarrow$  6 weeks after exposure  $\rightarrow$  3 months after exposure

## Accessing HIV Point-of-Care (POC) Testing

Patients can access point-of-care (POC) testing at WDGPH's Guelph clinic (160 Chancellors Way) by booking an appointment (1-800-265-7293 ext. 7006).

## **Accessing Post-Exposure Prophylaxis (PEP)**

Individuals with a high-risk HIV exposure in the **past 72 hours** should be considered for post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP), in addition to being tested for HIV.<sup>1,2</sup> An assessment algorithm for PEP is included on page 12 of the <u>new HIV guidance</u>. PEP should be started **as soon as possible** following the exposure.

## **Accessing Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis (PrEP)**

Individuals at ongoing high risk for HIV infection should be considered for pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP). These individuals include (but are not limited to) <u>MSM</u> who report condomless anal sex within the last six months and with any of:

- Infectious syphilis or rectal bacterial STI, particularly if diagnosed in the preceding 12 months:
- Recurrent use of nonoccupational HIV PEP (more than once);
- Ongoing sexual relationship with HIV-positive partner with substantial risk of transmissible HIV; or
- High-incidence risk index (HIRI)-MSM risk score ≥ 11.<sup>2</sup>
